# Legislative Framework

- Land Reform (Scotland) Act 2003
  - General right of responsible access
  - Core Paths Plan
- Scottish Outdoor
  Access Code
  (statutory guidance)



#### Core Paths Plan


- Statutory duty to develop '...a plan for a system of paths ("core paths") sufficient for the purpose of giving the public reasonable access throughout their area.'
- A power, but not a duty, to maintain core paths
- Glasgow's Core Paths Plan was adopted by the Council in April 2012.

# Core Paths Planning – the process

- 1<sup>st</sup> draft based on in-house knowledge and access forum input > identifying key routes > informal consultation
- o 2<sup>nd</sup> draft > statutory consultation
- Consider comments and resolve objections
- Amend and adopt plan

# Future changes to the Plan

- Adding core paths = review with full consultation (LDP cycle)
- Changing or removing core paths = local review with relevant consultation
- Diversion and stopping-up in relation to a planning application
- Temporary closures of core paths: section 11 order; H&S and/or site management (N.B. Commonwealth Games – Glasgow 2014)



#### Core Paths - characteristics

#### What is a core path?

- Appears on Core Paths Plan
- No defined specification (can be any width, gradient or surface, incl. water)
- May, or may not, also be a right of way
- Can be used by all non-motorised users provided they take access responsibly
- 24 hour access\*
- Not necessarily suitable for all users

# Core Paths Plan – role in Glasgow

- Mainly a planning tool
  - Enables forward planning by highlighting gaps in network
  - designation provides some 'protection' in planning decisions
- Assists with prioritisation of resources
- 'Raw material' for network promotion (leaflets, maps)

# Core Paths Plan – role within the planning framework

- Supporting document to Local Development Plan – will be 'supplementary guidance' in future
- Supports various policies (incl. placemaking, connectivity, health, green network, etc)
- Core paths are a material consideration in planning decisions

# Core Paths & Cycling

- Cyclists can use core paths, provided it is safe & responsible to do so (see Outdoor Access Code)
- Core paths on roads: cycling on the footway is authorised <u>by default</u> – but responsibility clause still applies
- 'Horses for courses' e.g. footway more suitable for young and/or inexperienced riders: common sense approach.
