
## **Statement of Reasons**

In accordance with the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984, it is considered necessary to make the above Order:-

'for preserving or improving the amenities of the area through which the road runs'

## Report

The purpose of the 20mph zone is to ensure that vehicle users reduce their speeds to 20mph or less, and therefore improve road safety for pedestrians, cyclists and all other vehicle users. By turn, it is anticipated that this will encourage more people to walk and cycle, which would have associated health benefits.

Furthermore, a report by Department for Transport (DfT), titled, 'Relationship between Speed and Risk of Fatal Injury: Pedestrians and Car Occupants', notes the following benefits:

- If someone is hit by a car at 40 mph they are 30% likely to be killed.
- If someone is hit by a car at 30 mph they are 7% likely to be killed.
- If someone is hit by a car at 20 mph they are 1% likely to be killed.

In addition to this, the 'Traffic Signs Regulations and General Directions 2016' (TSRGD) states that no point within a 20mph zone shall be more than 50 metres from a prescribed traffic calming feature. This means that traffic calming features can be 100 metres apart, with the exception of culde-sacs less than 80 metres long in which case no feature is required.

Traffic calming measures will be located no greater than 100 metres apart within all proposed 20mph zones, in accordance with TSRGD requirements.

'20' roundel markings will also be established at the zone entry/exit locations and within the zones given that they are now a prescribed traffic calming measure under TSRGD 2016.
